CAPES is the Governor's Project.


Through the three main objectives of the service project, more communities will be transformed worldwide with the help of each and every Key Clubber.

#### Bring Up Grades

A Kiwanis program that encourages kids to reach high academic achievements in their curriculum, it is

#### K-Kids

A Kiwanis student leadership program concerned with building character amongst kids attending elementary school, participate in the developmental process of these kids. By becoming a part of their lives you can make sure they have ethical and moral lessons instilled within them.

#### Beyond Words

This project is about spreading gratitude throughout your life and those around you. Gratitude has been recognized as one of the most powerful emotions. To do this, your club will order 5-10 gratitude rings. Each member will have a ring, each time you look at the ring you have to think of something you are grateful for. The idea is to bring more positive thought to yourself. Once you are in the habit of being grateful for everything you have, you give the ring to someone else in your community and tell them how it works. The idea is to create a more

grateful community with all the teenagers and adults in your community.

#### Anti-Bullying Programs

By working with your local elementary/middle schools with Anti-Bullying programs, your club is teaching children the importance of being kind to one another. If children are taught strong morals such as these at a young age, we can create a more socially aware generation of people.

#### Random Acts of Kindness Cards

By organizing a random act of kindness campaign in your community you can teach people the value of kindness and generosity. Have cards made and have them passed along as each people do something kind for those around them. Create goals for your club and have a start and end date for the project.

## Leadership



#### **Character Camps:**

Volunteer at a children's camp and teach by example, demonstrating aualities that constitute a good leader. For example, teach students to be accepting of other children by playing a game that promotes inclusiveness and teamwork. Emphasize to the students the importance of clarity and effective selfexpression to avoid miscommunications and arguments.



#### **Leadership Lessons:**

Spend time with students at an after-school program such as after-care at a school, Boys and Girls Club, or YMCA. Play leadership building exercises such as tossing a ball around and asking each student to list a quality of a good leader when they catch it.

## Inclusiveness

Open Arms It is the responsibility of older students to train younger students. For example, juniors and seniors train the sophomores on how to be hospitable to the incoming freshmen and parents at events such as orientation and open



house. This can also be done with 8th graders teaching 7th graders how to welcome the 6th graders. Teaching a younger audience to be welcoming to the outside provides the foundation for inclusiveness in the coming years of either

middle school or high school.



Make a New Buddy This program will require people to engage with one another. They are required to spend some time with someone they don't generally spend time with. For example, once a month, a system could be set up where at every lunch period people are required to sit with

people with whom they do not usually sit.

Together We Unite Key Club members should work with their Builder Clubs to

help the Aktion Club. In the process, they should teach the younger children that someone's age or mental ability does not define them. This gives Key Club members the opportunity to serve with people of all ages and abilities.



Youth Give Back to Elders Key Club values the importance of giving back to one's community. The community we currently live in was created by our elders and it is now in our hands to improve it and to give back. Key Club members could take members of their local Builder's Club to visit a nursing home. Here they could talk to the elders about how the community was in their youth and what they did to improve it. The point of this exercise is to show the children the power of service and how it shaped today's world.

# Caring



Three Generations of Caring Set up a system in which elementary and middle school students can partner with a Key Club buddy to visit a nursing home or retirement community. With the help of the older student, the children will be able to learn how to care for

"Slumber Party" Invite a group of students to come spend time with children in the pediatric ward of a local hospital. As these children often miss out on typical childhood experiences such as pajama parties, you could make the visit "slumber party" themed and ask visitors to wear pajamas and bring movies and popcorn.



Caring for Critters

Take a group of individuals (of any age group)

to a local animal rescue shelter to volunteer. Animal rescue

Growing Good Citizenship A crucial aspect of citizenship is giving back to the community. Key Club members could work with younger kids to help plant a community garden. Not only will this be a wonderful addition to their community, but it could also be



A Play of Kind Acts Spend the day with young children and teach them how to put on a play that showcases the characteristics of being a good citizen. While they are having fun putting on the play, the children would also be learning how to be good citizens.



The Buddy System Take a younger person under your wing for a certain period of time and teach them all you can about being a better person. This can be done in various ways and with various individuals (neighbor, younger classmates, etc.).



A Good Deed Workshop Hold monthly workshops for kids, where parents are invited to learn ways of teaching kids on being good citizens. It can be taught in different ways whether it be involving presentations, activities, etc. This would be a great way to engage

## Scholarship



Visit preschools to read: Let's face it, kids over the age of 7 don't like reading, but when they are still young you can teach them better habits. Reading to a group of preschoolers in an eccentric way can show them that reading is fun and enjoyable. They will have a better chance of picking a book up when they are older and do the same thing that you did. Also you might get a lot of little smiles and hugs.



Volunteer in or start a study habits program: I believe that everyone is smart; it's just that not all people know how to bring it out. Study habits are important; making flash cards can be the difference between passing and failing grades. Start a group that teaches kids how to study, and help them create good habits they can use for the rest of their lives.



Directly tutor kids with poor grades: It can be hard to pay attention in a room with 25 or more other kids so sometimes a kid just needs some 1 on 1 time. Giving one or two students personal attention at a time and teaching them how to study or teaching them how to do something is impactful and helping, especially if the students are struggling and craving help.



Employ in the BUG program: BUG stands for (Bring Up Grades) The BUG program is a Kiwanis led program that focuses on bettering academic performances in children that are struggling. The goal is to bring up the student's GPA by 0.5 of a point by the end of the quarter. If successful the student is invited to a pizza of ice cream party as a reward. Contact your sponsoring Kiwanis for more information on this project.

## Sportsmanship



Don't restrict sportsmanship to sports: The definition given above mentions nothing about sports, so why should we restrict sportsmanship to sports alone. Go to schools or daycares and talk about sportsmanship, or show it in a way that doesn't seem conventional. Take this as an example: play a board game and intentionally lose. For the next 10 minutes act like a sore loser. When your opponent is clearly annoyed say to them "It's annoying isn't it?" Instead of just talking about sportsmanship you can show the lack thereof to show why it is so important.

**Volunteer at a summer camp or daycare**: In an area full of hyper and active children, there will be plenty of opportunities to show sportsmanship (among other lessons). If you are consistently present, your opinion and acts will be noted as the children get to know you. This will make your lesson all the more impactful. This is possibly the best way to teach sportsmanship.

**Organize a field day**: Nothing teaches a large mass of children sportsmanship more than putting a ton of them together to play games all day; however this field day should have a twist. You should set up a staff of strict referees or officials and actually call out things like a real game or event. When the day is over reward the children that best exemplified sportsmanship.

**Play with Kids**: Actions speak more than words, so why don't you take a large group of volunteers to an elementary school to play games with the students. Show your good sportsmanship, it may not seem like much but when an older person is showing such traits they are easily picked up. If necessary say something to a student or volunteer who is being a bad sport.
